

American Psychological Association (APA) Referencing Style

7th edition



Introduction

The University adopts American Psychological Association (APA) referencing system as the main referencing style for all Faculties. Some programmes may use other common referencing system due to the professional or other specific requirements including Harvard Referencing, IEEE and others.

This guide provides the basic referencing rules for APA 7th style. For complete information and guide, kindly refer to the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association: the official guide to APA style* book which is available in the Library. (Call no. 808.066 15 PUB 7th ed.)



Elements of referencing

Referencing in the APA style has two parts:

i) In-text citation

APA uses author-date in-text citations. There are two formats for in-text citation: parenthetical and narrative.

Parenthetical Citation: Both the author and the date are separated by a comma within a parentheses.

For example: (Samuel, 2022).

Narrative Citation: Author name appears in the body text while the date included after the author name within a parentheses.

For example:

Samuel (2022) showed in the study ...

Elements of referencing (con't)

ii) Reference list

This is a list that contains all the bibliographic details and need to be included at the end of your assignment/project. The rule is that, all in-text citations must have a corresponding entry in your reference list and vice-versa.

References that took up more then one line will need to be formatted with a hanging indent of 0.5 inches from the left for the subsequent lines.

For example:

Author Rules

No. of Authors	Examples
Single author	List the surname first, followed by a comma and the initials. Use one space between initials. Berndt, T. J. (2002). Friendship quality and social development. <i>Current Directions in Psychological Science</i> , 11, 7-10.
2 authors	List by their surname and initials. Use one space between initials. Use a comma to separate a first author's initials from the second author name and use the ampersand (&) instead of "and". Wegener, D. T., & Petty, R. E. (1994). Mood management across affective states: The hedonic contingency hypothesis. <i>Journal of Personality & Social Psychology</i> , 66, 1034-1048.

Author Rules (con't)

No. of Authors	Examples
3 to 20 authors	List by their surname and initials. Use one space between initials. Use a serial comma to separate author names, while the last author name is preceded again by ampersand (&). Kernis, M. H., Cornell, D. P., Sun, C. R., Berry, A., White, A., Ganster, D. C., & Harlow, T. (1993). There's more to self-esteem than whether it is high or low: The importance of stability of self-esteem. <i>Journal of Personality and Social Psychology</i> , 65, 1190-1204.
More than 20 authors	List by their surname and initials. APA 7th ed. uses "" instead, replacing all authors between the 19th author and the last author. Kalnay, E., Kanamitsu, M., Kistler, R., Collins, W., Deaven, D., Gandin, L., Iredell, M., Saha, S., White, G., Woollen, J., Zhu, Y., Chelliah, M., Ebisuzaki, W., Higgins, W., Janowiak, J., Mo, K.
